Elephants: Destined to Extinction Can We Stop It?



How would you feel in a world without elephants? Well, you may

be about to find out. Elephants are in critical danger of becoming extinct. The population is declining very rapidly - about 600,000 a year since 2006. Elephants are illegally hunted or poached for their ivory. Ivory is used for many products, such as jewelry, sculptures and tools. Ivory is mostly wanted in Asian countries. These countries' economies are booming so people worldwide can afford ivory products, although the prices are up to \$1000 per Ib. The ban on ivory poaching was enforced in 1989, but many countries have largely ignored this ban. "Without these countries, this [trade] would all but dry up," says Robert Hormats, a senior U.S state department member. Countries are offering great amounts of money to African poachers for ivory. In some cases, that money can be tempting. In Uganda, there is a war between the Ugandan government and a group of rebels called the Lord's Resistance Army. The armies could use the money to arm their forces. Ivory poaching has been going on for centuries. Before synthetic materials were invented, ivory was the most commonly used item. This poaching must stop. Elephants are being hunted down to extinction. Ele-

phants will either face extinction or survive. Ivory poaching is at critical levels. If poachers continue at this pace, elephants will face extinction in 8 years. Help save the elephants today!

2 ½ teaspoons powder	baking
¼ teaspoon	salt
2 eggs, beaten	

Oven Temperature: 400° F
